

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PASTOR'S DESK by Father Hovnan Demerjian

The church is near, but the way is icy....

It is difficult to be a priest and Florida and get the message across to people of God's invitation to his heavenly kingdom. It's so beautiful here in the winter, that heaven doesn't interest anybody. And it's so hot here in the summer that hell isn't that scary. It's a joke—but there is some truth in it—especially in the first part; that people like us who are basically comfortable, feel we have no need for God or his invitations for something better. "Thank you very much, God, I'm fine—you do your thing I'll do mine."

However, the Bible and our Armenian Church tradition is, at heart, a book of invitations from God to man—of God trying to break through to his chosen, to Abraham, to David, to King Trdat to me and to you. Unfortunately it also records the sad fact that many people throughout the ages have rejected His different invitations. "He came unto his own, and his own received him not." We read most weeks in the final Gospel from John.

Today's parable summarizes all God's invitations in history, and man's rejections in a few sentences. A King (God) prepares a banquet and has invited many people to come. When the day comes, most of those invited find bad excuses of why they can't come, "I have to work," "I already had an engagement, etc."

We exactly continue God's great banquet every Sunday. This is a meal with God that, unlike pretty much any party that anyone throws, we invite <u>everyone</u> to our banquet, every single week, forever—until the coming of Our Lord. Who has a wedding and invites everybody? Who has a Christmas dinner and invites everybody? No one does -but by the grace of God, we do.

As we know from experience, not everyone comes to church. Some have very good reasons, most others do not. There is a wonderful Ukrainian Orthodox Proverb: "The church is near, but the way is icy, the tavern is far, but I will walk carefully." We do what we want, what we love and what we value. We make excuses for what we don't want to do, don't love and don't value as much as something else.

The biggest problem of why people don't come to church is because they don't know Who has invited them to supper. It's not me. Many people make the mistake of worrying if I am pleased by their participation in church or disappointed at the lack thereof. I am on both counts, but don't worry about me! Almighty God, who made us and invites us to follow him, who has a purpose for our life more beautiful, meaningful and true than the way we are going about it alone. He invites us daily through prayer and study, and at the culmination of each week, to encounter him through Badarak and Holy Communion; in a word to eat at the banquet of the King.

And so the invitation stands, this Lenten season. Let us renew the strength of our the commitment that we made nearly a month ago at Lent's start, to deepen our connection to God, in and out of church, in preparation for his Easter Revelation. Let us by the strength of our example—the door of our church and our hearts wide open—encourage others in this church family to heed the Lord's invitation to grow in Him.

Let us share with others the honor, which brings us here every week. How, unworthy as we are, we accept the invitation to dine with a king, whose kingdom is not of this world, whose banquet begins here in this holy place, but for those who believe, carries on forever, now and always...Amen.

Parish Council: At our annual assembly, in February 9, 2014 the four positions that were available are filled by the same candidates for the next two years. Next year we will need three new candidates to replace Chris, David and myself, according to the bylaws we can serve for three terms of two year each and the time will come at the end of this term. <u>Choir:</u> Welcome to our snowbirds that were able to join our choir and bring the hymns to life. Gratitude also goes to Louise who has been teaching our youngsters every first and third Sunday the beautiful hymns of our church.

The Future: Gratitude to those who delivered their pledged contributions. Chuck Sarkisian is leading the Church Hall Fundraising Campaign and calling on all of us to participate. I am leading the team of volunteers who are working on preparing for the next stage of the construction. Our online auction will take place again this year in April, thanks to Andrew Anusbigian for organizing the auction. Please join us for the Gala, a Church Hall fundraising event on May 9, 2014.

Finally, I would like to thank our supporters and visitors from other states. Look around you and see who is less fortunate then you are. Those who are in need are looking for someone to talk to. See if they need a ride to the church and give them that joy in this holy time of Lent.

CHURCH HALL BUILDING REPORT by Chuck Sarkisian

With Faith We Shall Build | Հաւատքով Պիտի Կառուցենք


"You are the light of the world. A city that is set on the hill cannot be hidden...let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven (Mat. 5:14-16)."

Exactly a year ago we kicked-off our church hall building fund campaign. Who would have thought that during that year we would raise \$831,730 (83% of our \$1 million goal)?! This monumental accomplishment for a small parish like St. Hagop's bespeaks its parishioners' faith. You embraced our campaign's theme: With Faith We Shall Build...Հաւատրով Պիտի Կառուցենք and faith will carry us through our mission. Our faith is grounded in both our Christian beliefs and commitment to perpetuating our heritage.

Our journey to date

It was a busy 2013 campaign. Pledge cards were distributed and fund raising activities - such as the bazaar, silent auction, anniversary dance, New Year's Party and various women's guild activities - were dedicated to the church hall

building fund. These activities generated a total of \$68,742. Most important was the generosity of 136 donors pledging \$762,988. Our major initiative was a mailing campaign last summer. This effort was followed-up with two rounds of outreach calls by a dozen volunteers to answer questions and encourage parishioners who had yet to pledge to participate. Also, there was an outreach effort to benefactors beyond our parish; this resulted in contributions and pledges not only from our immediate community but throughout the U.S., from the Northeast to



California and from Washington State to South Florida. Our parishioners spread the word to family and friends who responded in kind. As of the date of this report, we have collected \$562,680; this money is deposited in our building fund restricted account and represents all the payments received to date along with proceeds from fund-raising activities.

Our mission is 100% parishioner participation

As Fr. Hovnan reminds us, our goal is not just to build a church hall but, more importantly, to become an engaged and committed St. Hagop church community dedicated to serving the Lord and preserving Armenian culture today, tomorrow and for generations to come. The church hall is only a means towards this end. It is critical that parishioners understand our mission and participate in our journey by contributing proportionate to their abilities. Your financial contribution, again proportionate to your means, represents your commitment to future Armenian generations.

Armenians are proud and sometimes adopt the false notion that a pledge must be "significant". The thinking is "it might be embarrassing to commit the limited amount I can afford, so I might as well skip it." Clearly, that is not what Christ and the Gospel taught us. Moreover, it is totally contrary to our mission! We envision the church hall to include a "Wall of Faith" listing the names of all donors for future generations to see and to proclaim our journey.

Again, our deepest gratitude to the 136 donors/families who have already made their commitment (see the list below identifying donors to date.) We heard some truly moving stories of faith. Like the parable of the widow giving her mite,

many donors made their contributions prayerfully. Some gave greatly and repeatedly as an expression of gratitude for our Lord's blessings.

Yet, only 56% of St. Hagop's dues paying members have participated! We pray for the remaining 44% that God will touch their hearts and brighten their circumstances so they can feel the calling to join our mission.

What lies ahead?

Our goal is to break ground Christmas day, January 6, 2015. We need \$168,270 in new pledges and \$437,320 in cash deposits to the restricted bank account to reach our \$1 million goal. Our commitment is to start construction only when all the money is in the bank.

This last stretch will be either easy or the most challenging yet, depending on you. If each of the 225 parishioners who historically have been engaged in St. Hagop and have yet to participate contributes *on average* \$749, we will reach our goal. So, if you do not see the name of a relative, parishioner, or friend on the list, please encourage them to participate. Also, a

reminder, the matching contribution program is still operational for 2014 (Please see me if you have any questions on how the program works). Let us make the last 17% an easy sprint, and maybe if we achieve our goals sooner, we can start the construction earlier.

- Send a special mailing expressing gratitude and update information to donors.
- Continue outreach to selected potential donors, including personal visits to encourage participation and secure some remaining naming rights (including some new naming rights just introduced) as shown in the table below:

At our last meeting we discussed how to get more families involved in sponsoring a coffee hour. We tossed around several ideas and decided that we would seek out four families a month to sponsor a Sunday. Please respond



positively when a member of the Women's Guild approaches you and asks if you and your family would bring food for one of the coffee hours we have after Badarak. In the past, we depended on cash donations to fund the next week's goodies. However, donations were sparse and women of the guild were the usual contributors to the coffee hour, but they want to spread the joy of giving to others in the church. A big thanks to Andy Anusbigian who generously donated the coffee we enjoy each and every Sunday for the past year. And with the number of coffee cans we have in the guild room, it looks like he may be supplying coffee for the next year! Please find some way to help out in order to make this more of a community where everyone is involved.

The last few months have been very busy for the Women's Guild. We participated in the Winter Bazaar by selling pastries. The women worked hard to prepare the pastries and work the table for two straight days to sell the goodies. Special thanks to Thelma Ross-Saroyan for taking it upon herself to organize a raffle and man the table for two days to promote and sell the tickets. Her efforts raised over \$300.00 for the Church Hall. Thanks to all who donated items to the raffle and to those who purchased the raffle tickets. Going back a few months, two of our dedicated members decorated the church Christmas tree for the season. For several years, both Seta and Vicki have donated their time and decorative talents to making the church festive for the Christmas season. Thanks to Teresa for purchasing the poinsettia plants that adorned the altar during the season.

Tobe Mashkian hosted a High Tea and Fashion Show. If anyone knows the work that is involved in creating such an event, you will know the hard work, expertise and volumes of time Tobe put into making the show a great success. The theme behind the show was titled "Downton Abbey" after the popular show on PBS. Many of the women wore outfits from the Downton Abbey era of the 20's, 30's and 40's. We want to reignite the passion once felt by parishioners for decorating the altar with flowers every week. In the distant past, we had a signup sheet for volunteers who offered to bring in or pay for altar flowers. They were greeters at the High Tea and Fashion Show, lahmajoon vendors at the Winter Bazaar and help carry out plates of food to the pavilion for coffee hour. If you are a parent with daughters, find a place for them on any given Sunday helping serve at coffee hour, or helping clean up afterwards. We can use every helping hand and you will be teaching your daughters to serve God and the church for a lifetime!

Think ahead to Palm Sunday when we will have our Bake Sale. We can use our best bakers to bring their favorite tasty Armenian treats. We will have a sign-up sheet in the narthex for you to list what you will bring when it gets closer to Palm Sunday.

Nancy Poladian performs service work the first two Sundays every month taking blood pressure and offering advice on medical services available to members after Badarak. She is a nurse, part of "Faith Community Nursing" and is qualified to help with non-invasive procedures within the scope of her nursing license. She brings her blood pressure instrument every Sunday so if you need her to take your pulse and blood pressure on request, she is happy to do so.

As you can see, we are more than just baking and preparing coffee hour. Please join us. We can use your skills, talents and time in some way to serve God and our community! Come to the next meeting and bring up your idea for how you can serve!

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Church Armenian Word of the Day

Learn one word a week for a year, you'll know 50% of words used in Badarak (a different word printed each week in church bulletin Oct. '13-Oct. '14)

երկիր | yerkir | earth

This word appears in many well-known places in Badarak; in the *Hayr Mer* as well as *Soorp Soorp*. A compound form of the word is repeated several times in response to the priest's blessing when we bow and say "Asdudzo"

Yergurbakestsook."or "Let us worship God." The word for Worship in Armenian is a beautiful compound made from earth/yerkir and kiss/bakel. Thus to worship in the Armenian church is literally to kiss the ground!

արքայութիւն | arkayutyun | kingdom

Arkayutyun appears in important places in the Badarak, at the beginning and end of Hayr Mer and the end of the Creed/Havatamk. Arkayutyun is the same root as Greek "arkhi" forming many extant words in English of the same meaning i.e. monarch, oligarch and archbishop. Its frequent occurrence in Badarak makes sense as we recall Jesus Christ, the king whose kingdom is not of this earth, but of heaven. Reaching the kingdom of heaven, with Christ as our guide and strength, is the ultimate goal of the Christian journey.

pnη | togh | forgive

This word appears more than 20 times in Badarak; often in the form pnnnphiu-toghutyoon-forgiveness. This frequency reflects the main purpose of Badarak and the life of Christ, to be the means whereby humanity is forgiven from sin and reconciled again with God. "Togh" shares the same root with Latin based words like tolerate and extol, all stem from the proto Indo European root word for "to bear, to carry"

hug | hats | bread

In Armenian the word for bread, *hats*, is also the word for all food. When we call Jesus the "bread of life," when we pray "Give us this day our daily bread," when we take the bread of communion, we are not looking for a meal. We are asking the creator of all life to give us spiritual sustenance; energy, hope & strength to continue our journey.

մեր,մեկ,մեզ | mer,mek,mez | our,we,us

"Mer" and all its forms appear dozens of times in Badarak, notably in the title of Hayr Mer/Our Father. This is not surprising, since Christianity at its heart is lived together, in communion. Individual faith is important, but we must never lose a sense of the church community, called out by God and journeying together through this world and unto the next. For this reason, at the beginning of Badarak, we remember Jesus' words that, "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.'-Mat 18:20.

åեր | tser | your

As in many languages, Armenian has different forms for "your" singular/ familiar and "your" plural/formal. "Dzer" is the plural/formal way to say "your" in Armenian, where "Ko," as we already saw, is singular/familiar. Because Christians have the amazing privilege of addressing God with familiarity, we use "ko" when praying to God in Badarak. We hear "Dzer" less often, when we are referring to the church or other group of people, ie. "hantsans dzer" "your sins."

երկինք | yergink | heaven

This word appears in nearly all the well-known places in Badarak; in the *Hayr Mer*, *Havadamk* as well as *Soorp Soorp*. It is most often found in its plural form hphhuu-yergins-heavens. It is also very often found with the preposition J-hee added before it, which means "in", as in Jhphhuu-hergins-in the heavens. It is not surprising that this word is repeated so often in Church-which in our theology-is no less than the meeting ground between heaven and earth.

sup | char | evil

"Char" appears over a dozen times in Badarak, notably it is the last word of the Hayr Mer/Our Father (in the form "char-e" "from evil"). The root composition of this word is very interesting. It is made up of the negative prefix "\(\gamma\)" "ch", which means "not" and the word "up" "ar" which means "to make, create." Thus, in Armenian, evil is to "not create," literally to cause de-struction, unmaking what God the creator has made for, His and our eternal glory.

փրկիչ | prgich | savior

"Savior" occurs so many times in Badarak because Jesus' greatest mission for the world and for us has been to save mankind from our sin and reconcile us again to God. He accomplished this for all mankind through his death and resurrection, his salvation continues for each of us who believe in his name, encounter him in church and seek to follow him throughout our lives.

hunp | park | glory

Not surprisingly, this word, which expresses our worship, devotion and thanks for the greatness of God, occurs frequently in Badarak. We hear it all the time in the priest's shortest prayer and blessing "Park Hor yev Vordvo yev Hogvooyn Srbo," "Glory to the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit" and in the even shorter prayer of pious Armenians everywhere "Park Asdoodzo," or Glory to God!
