

TRANSFORMERS

PASTOR'S DESK by Father Hovnan Demerjian - Transformers

Just as Moses lifted up the snake in the wilderness, so the Son of Man must be lifted up, that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him. (In 3:14)

In mid-September (Sept. 12th this year) we celebrate the Feast of Exaltation, the joyous victory and celebration of the Cross. We tend to lose perspective on the significance of the cross. Sometimes the closer and more familiar something becomes, the more likely we are to overlook its power. The more we see the cross as a piece of jewelry, as body art, or as a liturgical prop, the less we remember its infamy as the instrument of death of the Savior of mankind and founder of our faith. So how is it then, that we can possibly exalt this horrific instrument of torture and death, every year around this time?

To help us enter into the mystery and power of the cross, I ask that you call to mind something else you may have seen one hundred times but probably not paid much attention to. The next time you are out for a walk or drive in your neighborhood, look up and notice those big gray cylinders-called transformers-that hang atop telephone poles every few hundred feet. The hidden forces behind what transformers do, will help us understand the hidden forces behind what the cross has done. These gray boxes transform dangerous and deadly levels of electricity coming from the power plant-hundreds of thousands of volts-and transform them into current safe and useable-110 volts. This transformed energy gives us light to work, preserves our food and makes the world run. This principle of the transformer is also the principle of the cross. There are dangerous and destructive forces of power in the world, but through the cross, it is transformed and changed into something essential to life.

The assigned reading for the Great Feast of the Cross, from the Gospel of John, uses a different metaphor, but the 'transformer' principle remains the same. The Gospel recalls when the people of Israel were wandering through the desert and had been bitten by snakes. Moses, inspired by God, tells the people to do something very strange: fashion a bronze snake, hang it on a tall pole and all those who gaze up upon it will be saved. To us, this may seem somewhat magical and pagan, but it is essentially a pre-scientific version of what we call a vaccination or inoculation. Give people just enough of a disease and they themselves can overcome it. The same poison or electrical current that in raw form will kill us, can be transformed by God into something that will save us. That is the mystery of the cross.

Jesus on the cross takes into himself the full voltage, the full poison of mankind's tragic history of war, violence and prejudice, but unlike anyone who has ever lived, he does not avenge his persecutors. He becomes the victim, but does not create victims in return. 'Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing.' (Lk 23:34) That's a big picture view of the cross, as transformer, as vaccination which transforms all the misplaced desires of mankind and turns them into self-giving love, the power by which we live, move and have our being.

This power of the cross is not to remain as theory or theology, however, it is to power the decisions and relationships of our daily lives. If someone has spoken unkindly or untruthfully about us, we can repay them with the same. But if we do, we miss our opportunity to transform their misplaced desire by the passion of the cross. Instead, if we resist paying back evil with evil, at that moment we forever and always transform a few volts of sinful energy into kingdom power, by means of the cross.

This kind of discipline is not easy. It is much easier to hang a cross on our wall, in our car, or over our chest, but not live that cross in our homes, at work and in our hearts. Yet in this season of the Exaltation, we are reminded that ritually lifting the cross on Sundays and daily lifting the cross within us, is the hidden secret that powers a life well lived. May we continue to work with God to exalt the cross within us, so that like transformers, we absorb and renounce the dark power of sin, transforming it by the light of His grace, now and always; amen.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT by David Kazarian, Parish Council Chair

The parish council has been very busy since the full reopening of the church after COVID restrictions and quarantine. After carefully weighing the pros and cons of opening the church we voted to reopen fully, albeit cautiously.

There have been many physical plant items that the council tackled during the last quarter of the year. Things like removing a dead palm tree and replacing it with a full grown tree, alterations to the pavilion, fixing of damaged flood lights and putting up new lights were completed. Some of you may recall recently it got very warm at church one Sunday. Much to our consternation we discovered one of the 3 air conditioners in the church was damaged to the point of needing a \$5,000 plus repair, which would put a new part in a 15 year old air conditioner. We voted to replace the air conditioner for twice that cost, but that would give us a new unit with greater efficiency and hopefully better longevity. But that one unit wasn't the only problem. The second unit by the choir loft had problems too, but we fixed that one for a tenth of what the first one had cost us. Hopefully that repair will keep that unit running.

Chuck Begian's eagle eye noticed a crack in the wall at the church. Our friend Oscar Picon came and reviewed the situation and reported that the crack was just separation of the drywall and a paint job and a little spackle will solve that problem. While somethings can be seen other things need background knowledge to find a problem.

We're fortunate to have many talented musicians at our church. One of those people is on our council; Haig Yaghoobian. In addition to being an incredible musician he understands musical instruments. While practicing on our piano he found some minor problems that needed repair and we've authorized that repair. But without his knowledge that would not have happened and could have caused down stream problems (in my opinion). While I've detailed more physical plant repairs than most want to know, I feel it's important for everyone to understand that the parish council is working on things behind the scenes to keep our church in pristine condition. Oh, there are other items that will be occurring in the future, but we're making sure that our sanctuary and hall are kept in good physical condition.

We've had discussions about Sunday school. I personally feel that we need a strong Sunday school and we need our youth to attend. We have many opportunities to teach the youth but if they don't come those are opportunities lost. When you're at church, look around you. I don't know the average age of our parish family but I'd bet it's high. The youth are the future, and one could say, without our youth our church has no future. That's why I feel Sunday School is so important. So if you'd like to volunteer let us know. Even if you don't want to volunteer, do it! Join a team and bring some excitement to the Sunday School Program at our church! It's extremely important!

Benefit Concert Celebrating Beethoven's 250th on October 17th at 1PM



Parish Council Member Haig Yaghoobian Offers 'Corona Concerts' in His Community



Not content to let a little pandemic get in the way of enjoying and sharing good music, Haig and Lorraine Yaghoobian have been hosting mini "Corona Concerts" to entertain friends and residents of their community. It started last year, with restrictions then in place limiting attendance to ten people at a time, but has now expanded to an audience of fifty, at a recent performance.

Haig plays his Mason & Hamlin 7' grand piano inside their newly-expanded Florida Room, overlooking a pond behind their home, with floor to ceiling windows

opened on two sides. They had a patio built, providing seating for twenty, with a sun-sail tarp overhead to provide shade for those guests, as well as others seated on the lawns. With such a big sound, neighbors from around the pond can hear clearly from their own homes, as well.

These informal concerts start with Haig giving a little background and history on the composers and their selections. After 30-45 minutes of music, Haig and Lorraine join the audience for drinks and conversation – and to enjoy Lorraine's famous cookies.

Programs have featured works by Chopin, Mozart, Beethoven, Schumann, Debussy, and Scriabin. Haig also includes a few popular "standards" at the end – including show tunes from the '40's to '60's that he's arranged. And, he concludes every performance with a rendition of "Sweet Lorraine".



Dear St. Hagop Faithful,

This past year of pandemic has been a difficult year for us all, isolating us from those we love and creating health and financial concerns for many. Many churches in turn experienced financial hardship, especially those whose income relies on in person collections and yearly food festivals.

Our church, however, has been blessed with minor financial disruption, mainly because of our stewardship model and the prayerful ethos that it has engendered. At St. Hagop we give not based on our attendance, nor for recognition, nor as fee for service; but because it is who we are as Christians and Armenians. In the face of pandemic, our gratitude for God's gifts motivates us to share our blessings with our church and those in need.

This past difficult year, we are pleased to report that stewardship pledges were down only about 10% from the previous year. Thusfar for 2021, we have 99 pledges for a total of \$147,510. This is inspiring for such a difficult year, even moreso when taking into account the large sums of money we have all sent to Armenia, as a church and individually, to help those in their time of need.

With Fall approaching, we are planning ahead for our 2022 stewardship campaign. Pledge Sunday is November 28, 2021, and you will receive a letter and pledge card for 2021 in early-November.

As you prayerfully complete your pledge for 2021 and contemplate your 2022 stewardship, we join you in giving thanks to God for his many blessings, and the great blessing of this generous church community of which we are all a part. Truly God has multiplied the time, talent and treasure we have offered at St. Hagop, and we pray God continue to protect and prosper this His beloved Church.
